End Human Trafficking Worldwide

It may be 2017, but slavery continues to exist in the world in the form of human trafficking. It is estimated that 21 million people worldwide, including 5.5 million children, are victims of trafficking and forced labor. It doesn't matter where you live—human trafficking has been reported in every U.S. state. In 2007, the United States Senate designated January 11 as National Human Trafficking Awareness Day to bring attention to the plight of those who are exploited.

Human trafficking has been likened to modern-day slavery that subjects children, women, and men to force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of commercial sexual exploitation or forced labor. This horrific practice can include prostitution, pornography, and sex tourism, as well as labor for domestic service, factory or construction work, and migrant farming.

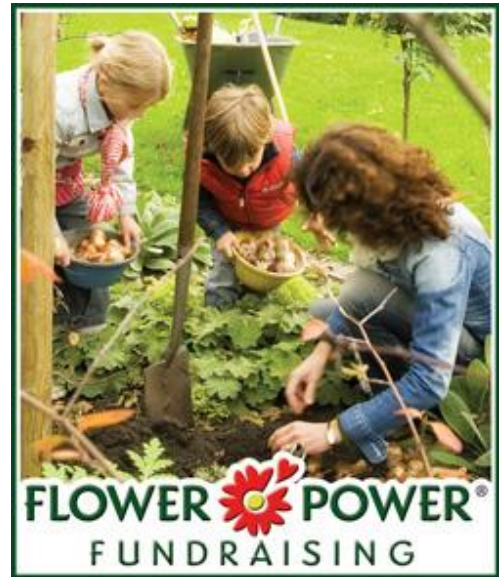
Digitizing the Past

The **Wake Forest Woman's Club** (North Carolina) marked its 55th anniversary as a GFWC-chartered club on December 1. At about the same time, the club's website editor, Sharon Rasmussen, completed a multi-year project to celebrate the organization's long history of community service by archiving memorabilia on the club's website at www.wake-forest-womans-club.com.

"When I joined almost six years ago, I offered to generate a website for the club. I envisioned a two-part site: a public page and a password-protected area for members," Sharon said. She easily filled the website's private area with materials such as forms used in the club's current work. However, she also wished to make historical scrapbooks, photo albums, and other memorabilia stored in bins in a rented storage unit, accessible to members. Sharon's goal was to include all of the historical documents on the website where members could enjoy and learn from them.

She experimented and decided the best method was to photograph the 2,000- plus documents and items and enhance the resulting images with Photoshop. Albums were later converted into multi-page PDFs. It has taken several years, but most of the historical artifacts are now displayed online. You may view one of the scrapbooks on the public page of the club's website. Other volumes will rotate as a means to keep the home page fresh for potential new members.

Personally having witnessed the passion and enthusiasm of the high school sophomores attending the seminars, she was strongly motivated to become a leader within the organization and to choose ILS for assistance during her administration.

Due to an even more profound connection, President Skubic advocates for the support of Easterseals. There was a time when her granddaughter Libby was considered unlikely to ever walk. However, with the help of programs and physical therapists provided by Easterseals, Libby not only walks but runs and plays. The dedication of the Easterseals' staff and their mission to change the way the world defines and views disability has made a lasting impact on President Skubic's granddaughter and countless others.

The final two organizations selected for support, St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital and Children's Research Foundation (CRF), also help children with medical concerns. CRF has been the Illinois Junior Project since 1979 and over the last 38 years more than \$400,000 has been raised to assist the Foundation. The research funded by the Foundation saves children like President Skubic's nephew who underwent open heart surgery just three days after his birth.

The organizations GFWC Illinois members will be supporting over the coming year have made a significant difference in their president's life and will doubtless benefit many others in the future. When clubwomen join forces, their collective impact can change lives.
