GFWC's Conservation Achievements

GFWC clubwomen have long been powerful advocates for environmental protection and conservation. As early as 1902, the GFWC Forestry and Irrigation Committee was working to preserve the Mammoth Grove Redwoods at Calaveras, California and the Chippewa Reserve in Minnesota. By 1910, clubwomen had successfully taken on so many environmental projects that a formal Conservation Department was formed.

On the national level, GFWC's conservation efforts have aided in the establishment of the United States Forest Service, the creation of memorial forests, and promotion of the Keep America Beautiful program. While we take great pride in these large-scale accomplishments, our greatest impact may well result from the thousands of local conservation projects clubwomen support each year.

This year's top projects for the Conservation Community Service Program, as selected by the program's chairman Angela Cutrera, demonstrate clubwomen's continued dedication to

There is no way to prevent it, and at present, no cure. The Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF) works every day in support of the scientific research for new treatments and therapies to make living with T1D easier, safer, and healthier.

Preshus Howard, GFWC Kentucky Director of Junior Clubs, is proud to support the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation as her Special Project. Since her sister, Ashley, was diagnosed with T1D at the age of three, Preshus has spent her life advocating

This October will mark the 30th anniversary of passage of the Domestic Violence Against Women Act. In honor of this landmark occasion, the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence has created a social media campaign – #DVAMTurns30 – and an accompanying toolkit. Commemorate this historic event

Preshus' advice to other clubwomen? Simply, "Get physical, be a social butterfly, or dream up your own fundraiser. There is fun and fulfillment in supporting T1D research. No matter what or how you donate, your gift will bring us even closer to a world without T1D."
