Remembering Mary Elizabeth Preston

It is with very heavy hearts we must announce the passing of Mary Elizabeth Preston, GFWC International Past President from 1978-1980, on Saturday, February 25, 2017.

Born and raised in eastern Kentucky, Mary Elizabeth was orphaned by age 16 and took the responsibility of caring for her brother and four sisters. Mary Elizabeth joined the Pikesville Women's Club after marrying and went on to live a life of volunteer service as a member of GFWC for over 75 years. She served as president of the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs from 1968-1970 before leading GFWC as International President from 1978-1980. During her administration, Mary Elizabeth promoted family unity and free enterprise, helped to establish the Korean Federation of Women's Clubs, and partnered with the Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership program (HOBY). After her term as GFWC International President, Mary Elizabeth worked in the White House, where she served as President Ronald Reagan's liaison to national social service and volunteer groups.

A Beacon of Hope

GFWC Massachusetts President Elfriede K. Parker has asked clubwomen in her state to support Boston Randolph Higashi School. The school's mission is to help children and young adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) reach their full potential. Through Higashi's signature Daily Life Therapy approach, students take on challenges, overcome obstacles, and gain confidence from achievements. Emphasis is placed on developing a love for learning through academics and courses in art, music, technology, physical education, and social skills development.

President Parker's connection to the school and children with autism is very personal. Two of her grandsons are autistic. Unfortunately, the diagnosis received by President Parker's grandsons is not uncommon. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, about 1 in 68 children has been identified with autism spectrum disorder. ASD is almost 4.5 times more common in boys (1 in 42) than among girls (1 in 189). In Massachusetts alone, 17,493 children age 3 to 21 received special education services due to ASD during the 2014-2015 school year.*

Massachusetts clubwomen will be aiding the Higashi School and autistic children by providing items needed for educational activities such as construction paper, colored pencils, and crayons. A donation of \$500 has already been given to the school and an additional contribution is being collected through a statewide quilt raffle and various fundraisers. As President Parker says, "the Boston Randolph Higashi School is a beacon of hope for children and families living with autism and deserving of GFWC Massachusetts' full support."

GFWC International Past President Marijo Shide is doing well and recovering from some recent health challenges. She continues to keep up with GFWC friends and news as best she can. Cards would be appreciated and are encouraged. Send warm wishes to:



Women’s History Month Spotlight: GFWC Arizona Women of the Past

Nellie T. Bush (1888-1963) was only five years old when her parents moved to Arizona from Cedar County, Missouri. She received her teaching degree from the Tempe Normal School, later renamed Arizona State University, and taught in Glendale, Arizona until her marriage in 1912 to Joe Bush.

Nellie and Joe relocated to Parker, Arizona in 1915 when he purchased the ferry business on the Colorado River. Not willing to stay at home, Nellie received a riverboat pilot’s license from San Pedro, California. For 17 years she was the first and only woman in Arizona to be a real “Tugboat Annie,” taking her son with her while she ferried people, produce, and livestock across the Colorado River between Arizona and California.

Almost as soon as Nellie arrived in Parker in 1915, she organized the Parker Woman's Club. This club, renamed the Parker Civic Woman's Club, became a part of the Arizona Federation of Women's Clubs in 1935. In 1954, Nellie became the 27th GFWC Arizona State President.

In 1920, Nellie was elected to the Arizona State Legislature, where she served for 14 years as a representative and two years as a senator. She spent six years getting a law degree after an incident in a bank where she thought the banker had cheated her. When her 16-year old son became interested in flying in 1931, she got her pilot's license and flew herself back and forth to the state capitol and across the state to meet with her clients. Her plane was the first in Parker, so the Bush family built the town's first airport. Nellie was a true statesman who was active in the state debate over water rights, serving as a member of the Arizona Colorado River Water Commission and the Colorado River Basin Committee. In 1936 she ran for Congress but was defeated and later said, "I haven't always won...but I always bounce back." Nellie Bush was inducted into the Arizona Women's Hall of Fame in 1982.
