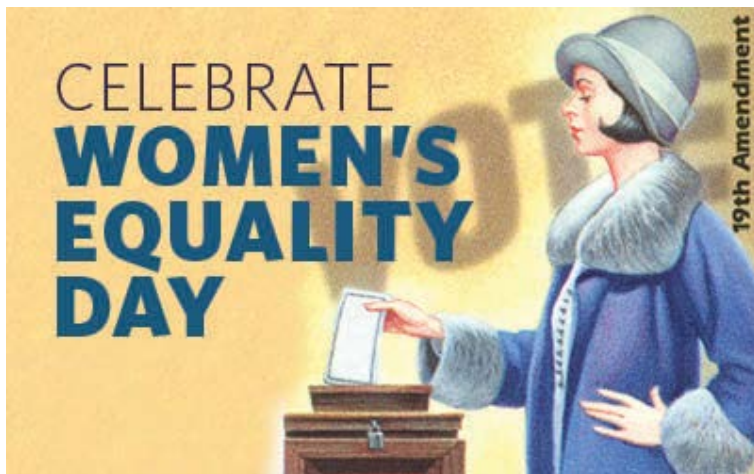

## Celebrate Women's Equality Day

This Saturday, August 26, marks the 46th celebration of Women's Equality Day! Women's Equality Day was first designated in 1971 at the urging of New York Congresswoman Bella Abzug as a way to commemorate the ratification of the 19th Amendment.

The 19th Amendment guarantees women the right to vote by denying the ability of the states and federal government to restrict voting rights on the basis of sex. Observance of Women's Equality Day helps to celebrate this monumental achievement to which GFWC was so integrally tied. However, it also highlights the struggle beyond the vote, and continuing efforts towards full equality. This is a journey which the women of GFWC have, and continue to, contribute so much.

The women of GFWC marched, protested, and organized for our right to vote, and persisted in struggling for equality well beyond the suffrage movement. In 1923, GFWC became an outspoken advocate for the Equal Rights Amendment, and remained so through the 1980s. The women of GFWC have championed women's education

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## Ending Food Insecurity in Massachusetts

Imagine a child who goes days without a nutritious meal, a child who never knows where her next meal will come from, or if it will come at all. Did you envision a child living in Massachusetts?

Hunger in Massachusetts, as in most states, is concentrated in specific areas and often goes undetected by the majority of residents. GFWC Massachusetts Director of Junior Clubs Martha Casassa and the state's Junior clubwomen are working to both raise awareness of food insecurity and combat its devastating effects by supporting Project Bread.

A statewide nonprofit, [Project Bread](#), has developed a series of programs and services to assist the one in ten Massachusetts' households that are food insecure. For example, Project Bread provides funding for food banks; works with local farmers to build a

Project Bread would be unable to do this vital work were it not for the generous contributions of community groups such as the GFWC Massachusetts Juniors. At the beginning of her administration, Martha's goal was to raise \$1,500 for the charity. However, after only one year, the Juniors have surpassed her expectations and raised well over \$3,000 by participating Project Bread's annual walk/run, through creative club sponsored activities, and by holding raffles at state meetings.

As Martha says, "There are so many children in Massachusetts that go hungry – over 400,000 of them! In today's world, this should not be." We are proud of all the Junior clubwomen who are answering Martha's call to make a difference in their state. GFWC West Virginia held a March of Dimes contest with a colorful twist. Sarah Jarrett, Director of Junior Clubs, and Rebecca Roll, the state's Advocates for Children Chairman, formed a virtual team for their local March of Dimes Walk, and set a goal to raise \$2,000. Sarah and Rebecca motivated their team by raising the stakes. If the Juniors could raise \$2,000, Rebecca would dye her hair March of Dime's signature color – purple!

To make things a little more interesting, the Juniors challenged the Woman's Club members to raise the same amount of funds. State President Sharon Sheridan accepted the challenge on behalf of the Woman's Club members, and took it a step farther by matching Rebecca's incentive and agreeing to dye her hair purple if her team could raise \$2,000.

In the spirit of the competition, the Juniors withheld the amount of money they raised until the very end so that the Woman's Club members would not attempt to beat their number at the last minute. The reveal would occur at GFWC West Virginia's summer conference. In the end, the Junior's secrecy was unnecessary, as the Woman's Club members triumphantly raised \$2,118 and the Juniors raised an equally notable \$1,500 for a grand total of \$3,618.

As she promised, President Sharon Sheridan donned purple hair at the conference dinner to celebrate her team's impressive feat, as well as their victory over the Juniors. Since Sarah Jarret's team lost, she had to wear a West Virginia University t-shirt the next day at the conference.

March of Dimes is one of GFWC's proud partnerships. The proceeds that both battling GFWC West Virginia's teams collected will fund research to improve the health of babies.
