Helping Children Succeed in School

Summer vacation will be gone in the blink of an eye and it will be time for coats, backpacks, and homework once again. While many parents have cherished memories of their own favorite lunch box or notebook, providing required school supplies for their children can be a burden. The National Retail Federation estimates families will spend an average of \$647 per child on back-to-school supplies and clothing -- an amount many low-income families simply cannot afford. Thankfully, GFWC clubwomen across the country are working to bridge the gap between what families can afford and what students in their communities need to succeed.

The **Woodstock Junior Woman's Club** (Georgia) partners with the nonprofit organization Give a Kid a Chance to provide children in Cherokee County all they require to head back to school. Items provided include: two pairs of socks, undergarments, two gently used outfits, books, haircuts, medical exams, and of course a brand new backpack filled with age-appropriate supplies. The club began supporting the charity in January 2016, when they were asked to serve as

backpack coordinators. As clubwoman Nitasha Ginn says, "The program spoke to our hearts and we jumped on board." Over the last two years, by working behind the scenes and with the assistance of local churches and businesses, the club collected almost 6,000 backpacks for children in their community.

Another club working to help students thrive is **GFWC Temple Terrace Junior Woman's Club** (Florida). The club has adopted Temple Terrace Elementary for the 2017-2018 school year due to the overwhelming need of the school's students -- a majority receive free or reduced price lunches. The club's first project to assist the elementary school is the provision of school supplies. Club members went house to house placing 1,000 flyers and brown paper bags in resident's mailboxes. Soon, clubwomen and members of the Temple Terrace Juniorettes will retrieve the brown bags filled with school supplies suggested in the flyer. Club President Coleen Garner says, "We expect the project to be a great success with over 100 donations arriving through the brown bag program."

There are undoubtedly numerous other GFWC projects underway, or about to get started, to ensure low-income students have the school supplies they need. 

President Lisa Hendrick, "Ohio United," was chosen to encourage communication and collaboration between clubwomen. "We want all Ohio clubwomen -- whether they be Juniors, Woman's Club members, or Juniorettes -- to work together as a united group," Deidra explained.

One of the projects Ohio's clubwomen are embracing is the [GFWC Campaign for the Future](#). The campaign, begun at the 2015 GFWC Annual Convention in Memphis, Tennessee, is a long-term fundraising effort to secure and sustain the property and programming of the Federation. Deidra and Lisa's goal for GFWC Ohio is to raise \$50,000 by encouraging each of the state's clubs to raise \$1,000. GFWC Ohio's pledge will entitle them to the naming rights of the Chief Operating Officer's Office at GFWC Headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Deidra believes that uniting Ohio clubwomen under one campaign will garner a greater appreciation for GFWC heritage and remind women why *Unity in Diversity* is our organization's motto. Clubwomen across the state of Ohio are already getting into the spirit of fundraising. The GFWC Ohio Warren Junior Women's League hosted a "Sip-n-Paint" event at Party Art Café and Studio. Members had fun painting canvases and pottery, and even held a basket raffle. All proceeds went toward "Ohio United" and Campaign for the Future.
