

New Hampshire State President's Project

Assisting NH Homeless Teens and Young Adults

It is springtime in New Hampshire, and with the blossoming of spring comes many celebrations; proms, high school graduations, college acceptances, scholarships, and weddings. For some, there will be no parties, graduations, or college; these are the over 15,000 unaccompanied homelessness teens and young adults in New Hampshire this year.

Kathy Farland, founder of Stepping Stones, spoke of this need in

Nashua at a 2021 GFWC-NH District meeting. Kathy, a former foster parent, founded Stepping Stones one year previously as a place where homeless youth can get the basics they need - a safe place to rest, food, showers/bathrooms, a place to keep their stuff, and someone to talk to. Kathy is passionate, hopeful, and recognizes that these teens and young adults want to be part of their own solution. From that district meeting forward, it was an easy choice: the 2022-2024 GFWC President's Project had to be: Assisting NH Homeless Teens and Young Adults!

Since selecting this for our President's Project, GFWC-NH clubwomen are working hard to support not only Stepping Stones but organizations like Waypoint and Family Promise so that our efforts reach all corners of our state to assist the homeless.

These homeless teens have no access to an automobile and driver's education. A car was high on Kathy's wish list for Stepping Stones for transportation and getting driver's licenses. Thanks to fundraising and Pine Hill Automotive Sales in Derry, NH, we were able to fulfill her wish!

Our GFWC-NH Annual Meeting on April 28 and 29, 2023, was a combination event where at our Banquet on Friday, we celebrated Federation Day with a Friendsgiving Event. We recognized seven non-profit organizations with Unity Awards for their work within GFWC CSPs and our President's Project...and Kathy Farland went home with Stepping Stone's much needed car!

Signature Program: Violence Against Native American Women

The first week of May is the National Week of Action for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women. Rates of murder, rape, and violent crime are all higher for Native American women than the national average. Native women also make up a significant portion of missing and murdered individuals.

- The National Institute of Justice detailed some incredibly startling statistics in an edition of their "Five Things" series dedicated to violence against American Indian and Alaskan Native adults.
- More than 84% of native women have experienced some form of violence in their lifetime.
- Native women experienced significantly higher levels of sexual violence and stalking than native men.
- The lifetime victimization rate for native women is 1.2 times higher than it is for white women.
- Female Native American victims are more likely to need services, but they are less likely to have access to the services they need.
- Interracial violence is more prevalent than intraracial violence 97% of native women victims experienced violence at the hands of non-Indian individuals.

- What can we do to help? As clubs and as individuals, we can all take time to learn more about the issue and to advocate for more attention, services, and public policy directed at protecting this incredibly vulnerable population.
- Plan a club event where you watch a movie like Wind River or Prey or watch Episode 6, Season 3 of Yellowstone. After the screening, discuss the portrayal of violence against American Indian women.
- Locate your local victim assistance providers and volunteer. Inquire about services supporting native victims and offer to help.
- Sign up for alerts from the GFWC Legislative Action Center and respond to calls to action supporting all victims of violence. Be alert to local legislation in your area as well.
