Legislative Corner

To encourage participation in the democratic process, this monthly column aims to inform members about current legislation and programs that are germane to the GFWC Resolutions. It also highlights important actions of Congress and the White House, and provides follow-up information about GFWC Legislative Action Alerts.

October is National Domestic Violence Awareness Month: On October 29, GFWC International President Suellen Brazil attended a celebration of the 40th anniversary of the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) hosted by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). This event featured innovative survivor-led solutions, expanded hotline services, and critical partnerships that have positively impacted survivor services. Authorized by Congress in 1984, these programs foster the public health approach to genderbased violence. Initiatives focus on preventing sexual violence utilizing evidence-based approaches such as bystander intervention programs and efforts to empower young people to speak up against sexist language and behaviors that promote violence. Funding is provided to the national network of local domestic violence shelters and support services, the National Domestic Violence Hotline, the Love is Respect Dating Abuse Hotline promoting healthy relationships for teens and young adults, the StrongHearts Native Helpline to support Indigenous women and girls, and interagency collaboration on sexual violence against people with disabilities. Significant efforts are focused on prevention of substance abuse, reduction and prevention of maternal deaths

due to violence, and addressing other at-risk factors. FVPSA funding has expanded community-based coordination of resources for survivors, including safe and affordable housing, multi-generational violence prevention programs, culturally specific services, sexual assault prevention and services, and integrated public health partnerships.
