Teen Dating Violence

Advocate & Educate

Teen Dating Violence (TDV) is a type of Intimate Partner Violence that can take place in person or virtually/electronically. Some examples include repeated texting or posting sexual pictures of a partner online without consent. Due to their youth and inexperience, teens can think teasing and name calling are a normal part of a relationship. But these behaviors in fact can turn abusive, developing into more serious forms of violence that oftentimes goes unreported.

According to data released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Youth Risk Behavior Survey and the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey, millions of teens are affected by TDV in the U.S. each year.

Here are some projects to consider for the 2025 GFWC IDS on September 27:

- Organize an information session at a local school for parents and teens about TDV between September 21-27.
- Sponsor art classes for local high schools in which students make posters about
 dating abuse and domestic violence awareness and prevention. Encourage the use
 of photography, computer graphics, and artwork to make the posters unique. Work
 with your local library or community center to post finished artwork for the entire
 community on September 27.

- Develop an educational program for pre-teens and teens to learn safe and healthy
 relationship skills between September 21-27. Provide handouts with information on a
 resource to help should they identify as experiencing TDV.
- Partner with local middle and high schools to host interactive workshops or assemblies on healthy relationships, warning signs of abuse, and how to seek help during the week of GFWC IDS.
- Develop resource kits for teens that include hotline cards, info on digital safety, selfcare tools, and local support services. Partner with youth organizations, community centers, or shelters to distribute the week of GFWC IDS. Include GFWC-branded materials and affirming messages.
- Volunteer with youth-led organizations or programs that promote peer advocacy and teen leadership on dating violence prevention. Sponsor training for peer educators during the week of GFWC IDS.

United We Can End Domestic & Sexual Violence!

Please note due to the sensitive nature of your volunteer activities, when working directly with survivors, these organizations will require some initial training to help prepare you.

The TAKE IT DOWN Act has been passed by Congress and is on its way to the President for signature!

Honoring those in the armed services is a crucial way to express gratitude for their selfless service while protecting our freedom. Both enlisted members and veterans put their lives at risk to serve the country, often facing hardships supporting their families. Supporting these heroes and their family members is a way to acknowledge the lasting impact of their service. The GFWC Massachusetts State President's focus project is working with Project New Hope, Inc., which offers vital emotional and physical support programs for the military and wonderful outreach programs for family members.

Amazing ways Project New Hope, Inc. helps alleviate some financial burdens are through a food pantry. It includes a baby pantry filled with food, diapers, clothing, and toys; a summer Farmers Market offering free, fresh fruits and vegetables; the Back-to-School Backpack Brigade; and Operation Jeepers Christmas. There are plenty of choices clubs can support.

The US Coast Guard Museum Foundation (USCGMF) is another area the Armed Forces members support. After attending a USCGMF reception aboard the USCGC Broque Eagle,

hearing firsthand about the new National Coast Guard Museum opening in 2026, adding this to GFWC Massachusetts' focus areas was simple. Meeting two women Commanding Officers— the Captains of USCGC Brogue Eagle and the USS Constitution was inspiring. Learning about the leadership opportunities offered to women in the USCG has solidified the support of this program. GFWC Massachusetts has raised funds and purchased a Commemorative Paver and is looking forward to the opening of this history-making, innovative museum.
